Another great party


Older dykes sure know how to enjoy themselves! Once again Margot opened her perfect party house for a dazzling end-of-

Vale Kate O'Brien



Kate O'Brien, playwright, poet and editor, died on Christmas Day while holidaying in Bali with her family. She was 67.

Kate enjoyed Ten Forty events and was a member of Websisters, wielding her considerable word-smithing skills on many of the pages of the **olderdykes.org** site.

In mid 2009 she was diagnosed with multiple myeloma, a cancer of the bone marrow. She was aware that a cure was not possible, but in her determination to drink life to the very last drop accepted every treatment, including a stem cell transplant.

Throughout those painful years – sometimes in hospital but mostly at home – Kate always remained positive, and welcoming of the company and support offered by loving friends. As well as her friends in Sydney, visitors came from Melbourne, Canberra and Adelaide, cities where she had previously lived.

And Kate never stopped writing: plays, poetry and short stories, and editing others' work. In July 2012 Last Songs – a play based on her own life about the passionate love between two married women – was performed at Melbourne's La Mama theatre. And in November last year Flaunt 4, edited by Kate, was released. Kate wrote generously of the lesbian story-tellers in Flaunt: "Talent is bursting from these pages, much of it wrestling with the eternals of love and death. There is, as I'm sure you'll find, drama, passion, wit, humour, breadth of imagination in these works. There is deftness of touch; there is beautifully crafted, confident work." Had I Kate's gift for words, these are the very ones I would use to describe her own talent.

A celebration of Kate's life for family and friends will be held in mid-February. A notice will be sent out via Contact for those who would like to pay tribute to the life of this gracious and inspiring friend, mother and sister.
