The Secret Diaries of Anne Lister

Ed. Helena Whitbread \$29.99 Little Brown 2010

The discovery and decoding of a remarkable four-million word diary by an upper-class Englishwoman by the name of Anne Lister (1791–1840) has turned the presumptions of a genteel world of fanwielding women on its head.

Her diaries are a piece of lost lesbian history. Anne Lister defied the role of womanhood seen in the novels of Jane Austen: she was bold, fiercely independent, a landowner, industrialist, traveller - and lesbian.

"I love and only love the fairer sex and thus beloved by them in turn, my heart revolts from any love but theirs."

Anne wrote in detail about her love affairs with other women. Her descriptions of society life, detailing the shortcomings of the local dignitaries, the loaded conversations of tea parties and the remarkable fact that aspirational parents would throw their daughters Anne's way so they could climb the social ladder.

The Secret Diaries have been adapted as a BBC TV film starring Anna Maddeley.

The film tells the story of a wealthy landowner in 19th century England, Anne Lister, and the love of her life, Marianna. The two are soul mates and Anne is deeply in love. Marianna is married off to an older man, according to the era's social requirements, leaving Anne devastated and heartbroken. They attempt to stay "together" but distance and social responsibilities take their toll and it seems almost impossible for the two women to even spend a small amount of time alone. Anne is also caught up with a third woman, creating a bizarre love triangle, as well as her attempts to forget Marianna through affairs and other relationships. But can true love overcome all?
