At the February Ten Forty meeting Sylvia asked us: What do you know about first aid? Would you know what to do with an unconscious person? What can you do if you can't do CPR?

Sylvia did a wonderful job educating us about current first aid practice with lots of handouts and practical sessions, which were very interactive.


We took turns to role play rescuer and rescuee.

Government policies on older lesbians and gays

In an article called 'Centrelink sympathy for fearful gay couples' published in the SMH on 15 January 2010, Adele Horin writes that:

"The Federal Government has promised to take a compassionate approach to elderly gay couples and same-sex couples living in rural areas who are affected by new social security laws.

In a letter to gay organisations the Minister for Families, Housing, Community Services and Indigenous Affairs, Jenny Macklin, said Centrelink would take into account people's fear of discrimination in determining their social-security debt. If same-sex couples who individually receive government payments had failed to register with Centrelink because of "a legitimate fear that they or their partner will be discriminated

against", Centrelink would consider waiving the debt, the letter said."

Whose laws are they?

The following is an open letter to Dr. Laura, a US radio personality, penned by Jim, a US resident.

(It's been in our newsletter before, but we think it's worth re-printing.)

Dear Dr. Laura

Thank you for doing so much to educate people regarding God's Law.

I have learned a great deal from your show, and try to share that knowledge with as many people as I can. When someone tries to defend the homosexual lifestyle, for example, I simply remind them that Leviticus 18:22 clearly states it to be an abomination. End of debate.

I do need some advice from you, however, regarding some of the other specific laws and how to follow them.

1. I would like to sell my daughter into slavery, as sanctioned in Exodus 21:7. What do you think would be a fair price for her?

2. I know that I am allowed no contact with a woman while she is in her period of menstrual cleanliness Leviticus 15:19-24. The problem is, how do I tell? I have tried asking, but most women take offense.

3. Leviticus 25:44 states that I may indeed possess slaves, both male and female, pro-

vided they are purchased from neighbouring nations. A friend of mine claims that this applies to Mexicans, but not Canadians. Can you clarify? Why can't I own Canadians?

4. I have a neighbour who insists on working on the Sabbath. Exodus 35:2 clearly states he should be put to death. Am I morally obligated to kill him myself?

5. A friend of mine feels that even though eating shellfish is an abomination - Leviticus 11:1 it is a lesser abomination than homosexuality. I don't agree. Can you settle this?

6. Leviticus 21:20 states that I may not approach the altar of God if I have a defect in my sight. I have to admit that I wear reading glasses. Does my vision have to be 20/20, or is there some wiggle room here?

7. Most of my male friends get their hair trimmed, including the hair around their temples, even though this is expressly forbidden by Leviticus 19:27. How should they die?

8. My uncle has a farm. He violates Leviticus 19:19 by planting two different crops in the same field, as does his wife by wearing garments made of two different kinds of thread (cotton/ polyester blend). He also tends to curse and blaspheme a lot. Is it really necessary that we go to all the trouble of getting

the whole town together to stone them? Leviticus 24:10-16. Couldn't we just burn them to death at a private family affair like we do with people who sleep with their in-laws? (Leviticus 20:14)

I know you have studied these things extensively, so I am confident you can help. Thank you again for reminding us that God's word is eternal and unchanging.
