Women in Australia 2009

Minister for the Status of Women, Tanya Plibersek has released the Women in Australia 2009 report.

The report found that women spend less time in the paid workforce, are more likely to work part-time, work fewer hours, and are more likely to have interrupted career patterns due to caring responsibilities. Women's employment is also concentrated in lower paying sectors and occupations.

Lethal.


Its scent will cling to your fingers,

Same sex legislation update

The Rudd Government has coughed up \$450,000 ahead of next week's federal budget as part of measures to "ease the impact" of the recent same-sex equality reforms. However, the grandfather clause, our preferred option, has been rejected. None of the money will go to the same-sex couples who will lose some or all Centrelink benefits from 1 July.

The National LGBT Health Alliance will receive \$350,000 to run a national education campaign to inform the community about the reforms and their impact. A further \$100,000 will go to the Welfare Rights Network to advocate on behalf of same-sex couples affected by the changes.
