# What does 'family' mean to us?

Rebecca Jenkins was guest speaker at the Dinner and Discussion evening on 6 April which was attended by around 25 women.

Rebecca completed her PhD in England and published two books: Tomboys and Bachelor Girls: A lesbian history of post war Britain 1945-1971 and A Lesbian History of Britain: Love and sex for lesbians since 1500.

A lecturer/researcher at Macquarie University Rebecca is half way through her research into lesbian views of family. She is interested in lesbian culture and parenting practices since 1945 and any differences over time. She has conducted 50 oral life histories so far. Interviewees were asked what they fantasised as a perfect relationship, how those expectations changed over time, and how finances were managed. Rebecca acknowledged that the results might look very different by the time the research is completed but spoke of the trends noted so far.

Lesbians in relationships in the 1940s to the 1960s experienced more family pressures and were more likely to marry a man.

Today, lesbians in their thirties are having longer relationships than lesbians in the 1960s had at the same age. Lesbians under thirty now expect to live together in long term relationships and have children.

Older lesbians value financial independence and women influenced by 1970s feminism

have more significant periods of being single. Lesbians in all age groups supported marriage equality but did not generally wish to be married.

Interviewees generally deflected questions about romance. Those of all ages said that there is no relationship without sex but that it is less important over time. Couples in their 20s and 30s reported not much, if any, sexual contact for about four years after conception.

In the 1980s in Australia lesbians had help from known men friends to become pregnant. Now middle class lesbians use IVF and those with less money have children from previous male partners and one night stands. Both co-mothers now expect to be called 'mother' and not to lose contact with children due to separation. IVF couples generally have a conventional family style with the birth mother staying at home and the other mother being the earner.

As always it was fascinating to have our lives reflected back and all were keen to hear more of Rebecca's research over time.

## Shulamith Firestone 1945 – 2012

Shulamith Firestone was a Canadian-born feminist. She was a central figure in the early development of radical feminism, having been a founding member of the New York Radical Women, Redstockings, and New York Radical Feminists.

Firestone's best-known work is her 1970 book *The Dialectic of Sex: The Case for Feminist Revolution*, written when she was 25. In it, she says that our culture of sex discrimination can be traced back to the biological structure of life itself. She claimed that advanced reproductive technology could liberate women from "barbaric" pregnancy and painful childbirth. By eliminating this fundamental difference between the sexes, sex discrimination could be eliminated.





# Margaret Thatcher – homophobe extraordinaire



She may have been the UK's first female prime minister but her funeral was the biggest parade of scary old white males seen in a long time.

Tributes to Margaret Thatcher poured in but surprise, surprise, her aggressive homophobia was largely ignored.

In 1967 homosexuality was legalized in the UK. In 1972 Thatcher imposed an anti-gay amendment to the law called Section 28. The amendment advocated censorship – preventing local councils and schools from discussing homosexuality or engaging in anti-bullying activities – and sneered at "pretended family relationships".

Thatcher made it very clear where she stood: "Children who need to be taught to respect traditional moral values are being taught that they have an inalienable right to be gay. All of those children are being cheated of a sound start in life – yes, cheated."

A number of support groups for lesbian, gay and bisexual student in schools and colleges across Britain were closed due to fears that they were breaching the Act. Arrests and convictions for consenting same-sex behaviour rocketed, as did queer bashings and murders.

Section 28 remained on the statute book until Labour eventually repealed it in 2003. In the House of Lords Baroness Thatcher continued to vehemently oppose repeal of the Act until her retirement in 2002.
