

Pearlie turned on a perfect Spring day for ten women who visited the Coal Loader Sustainability Centre at Waverton on Wednesday 2nd September. Starting with coffee and treats at the Grumpy Baker Café, we wandered a short distance down the road, taking a quick look at Berry's Bay to the east, and across to the centre which overlooks Ball's Head Bay to the west.

Vale Ruth Bader Ginsberg

Also known as the Notorious RBG, she died on 18th September, aged 87. She was nominated for the position of Associate Justice of the Supreme Court (USA) by Bill Clinton in 1993. She was still on the bench at the time of her death.

"I ask no favour for my sex. All I ask of our brethren is that they take their feet off our necks."

This quote originally came from Sarah Grimké. Sarah was born into a slaveholding family in Charleston in 1792. She died in 1873. The Grimké sisters, Sarah and Angelina, repudiated their southern values and moved to Philadelphia, where they joined the anti-slavery crusade.

This is what Sarah actually said:

"But I ask no favours for my sex. I surrender not our claim to equality. All I ask of our brethren is, that they will take their feet from off our necks, and permit us to stand upright

Vale Susan Ryan AO

Susan Ryan, a feminist icon of her time, died on 27 September 2020 at 77 years of age. She had been swimming on Friday and was taken ill to hospital and died on Sunday.

When Wendy McCarthy was asked how she would remember Susan Ryan, she said she was reminded of the T-shirt in the 1970s that said "This is what a Feminist looks like".

Susan helped create the Women's Electoral Lobby and as a single mother with two young children in Canberra, she decided to run for the Federal Senate with the slogan "a woman's place is in the Senate".

Susan, throughout the feminist debate on a restricted and fewer girls got into higher structureless society, argued for change education. Much of our community through structure. In 1975 she was elected thought all of this was OK." as a Senator for the ACT in Whitlam's Labor Government, the only woman in the Senate. She remained in Parliament for 12 years and during that time made changes to advance 1983, 3 out of 10 stayed to the end of year women.

Under the Hawke Government in 1983, she became the Minister for Education and Youth Affairs and was also given a totally new portfolio for government, the status of women. It was in these roles that her feminism shone through. She worked tirelessly to get the Sex Discrimination Act passed in 1983, and, the Equal Employment weeks ago she was a guest on the ABC's Opportunity and the Affirmative Action Act The Drum. in 1986.

All this was fought for with stiff opposition; however the foundations she has laid including from her own Labor Party remain and will continue to help women colleagues.

Before this time, Susan Ryan said, "It was not Rob unlawful to sack women who married or became pregnant, or just because they were women, maternity leave was scarcely available. Women could not get home loans. Girls' education was

Later as Minister for Education, she helped lift Year 12 retention rates; in 12 and by 1996, 9 in 10 stayed. This helped girls in particular, to stay till Year 12. Susan continued to be groundbreaking and was Australia's first Age Discrimination Commissioner in 2011, and Disability Discrimination Commissioner in 2014. She maintained her dedication to feminism and human rights and throughout her later years. Just a few

Susan will be sorely missed by many of us, advance.

Talking Books

This futuristic novel is also reminiscent of 1984. I haven't read it yet but hope to soon. A warning though, there's a bit of grizzly in this one.
